## NEW BURIAL OPTIONS NOW AVAILABLE

The Presbyterian Cemetery is excited to announce the addition of a scatter garden. A scatter garden provides an economical and environmentally friendly alternative to the in ground burial of a loved one's ashes. Thanks to the generosity of the Greater Lynchburg Community Trust, a grant was obtained by the Friends of the Presbyterian Cemetery for the creation of a scatter garden. The garden was designed by

landscape architect Laura Rosser and installed by Rosser Landscaping.

According to industry figures released by the Nation Funeral Directors Association of North America, the cremation rate in 2015 was 49% nationwide. Cremation has become the preferred option for many. The reasons are numerous: greater religious acceptance, cost, and the desire to be good stewards of the land.

The Presbyterian Cemetery is pleased to offer families multiple options for remembering their loved one. For those who

wish to be cremated, families can chose to bury the cremains in a traditional plot, purchase a niche in one of our columbaria, or scatter the ashes in our newly installed scatter garden. As always, traditional burials continue and plots are available for purchase.

By choosing to scatter or bury a loved ones ashes in a cemetery, a place of permeant remembrance is established. Future generations have a tangible place to go and honor a loved one. If you would like more information on burial options please contact the cemetery.



## CHANGES IN THE LANDSCAPE

In 1874 the trustees entered into an agreement with John H. Tyree to obtain land for the purpose of expanding the cemetery. Dotted with maple trees, this new section was often referred to as Maplewood. Over the years, efforts have been made to preserve these trees but unfortunately some are diseased and dying. In the past six months two maples have been removed. Your generous donations make this possible.

## STORIES IN STONE

*Katherine Garland Diggs-Educator and Philanthropist.*

An extraordinary woman, Katherine Garland Diggs is an example to all. Her simple bequest has had a lasting impact on our community. Born on December 16, 1885, she was the daughter of Judge John Singleton Diggs and Lilly Slaughter Diggs. For 39 years she taught in Lynchburg public school system.

Educated and well-traveled, her passport indicated that she visited Europe aboard the famous Cunard ship, the

Aquitania. The Aquitania was a luxury liner used by royalty, movie stars, and politicians. Her travels enhanced her classroom interactions and she was regarded by all to be an excellent educator.

Coming from families with strong legacies, Miss Diggs also had a desire to make a lasting contribution to Lynchburg. According to her attorney, she conceived the idea for a museum when she was in her early 50's and began to plan her bequest. Upon her death in 1971, her entire estate, valued at over \$300,000, was designated for the establishment of a museum system in the city of Lynchburg. Point of Honor, the former home of Dr. George Cabell is a result of her bequest.

The following was read at her funeral. A fitting tribute to someone who cared so much about educating all.

## LYNCHBURG'S HISTORY IS HERE!

The appeal of visiting any historic cemetery is the opportunity to see a snapshot of life and the social customs associated with that community during a specific era. Each stone represents a life. Marriages, divorces, losses, and financial struggles are recorded for posterity. It is our challenge and privilege to preserve and share these and the many other stories.

In the decade prior to the Civil War, Lynchburg was the second wealthiest city, per capita, in the United States. With its pastoral setting and proximity to the Diamond Hill neighborhood, the cemetery was "the place to be buried" for many of Lynchburg's more prominent citizens. A visit to the cemetery offers visitors a glimpse into Lynchburg during this time of great prosperity.

Most are unaware of how much of Lynchburg's earliest history is here. Many know of the Civil War soldiers buried within, but are surprised to learn of the cemetery's connection to the assassination of President Lincoln or to ChapStick, a world renowned lip balm.

It has been said that each of us has two deaths. The first is when we pass away. For a time we are remembered, but the memory fades with subsequent generations and that is our second death. By taking the time to visit the cemetery, you are paying your respects. It's

a way to honor all who came before you.

Whether you are a tombstone tourist, a historian, a genealogist, or just out for a walk, I encourage you to stroll the grounds of the beautiful outdoor museum we call the Presbyterian Cemetery.
